COUNSELOR'S CORNER

1. What is child abuse and why is it important to talk about it?

Child abuse is the physical, sexual, emotional maltreatment or neglect of a child.

Why is it important to talk about child abuse:

- To create awareness, most children or people don't know what child abuse entails.
- Early identification and intervention
- Empowering children
- Holding abusers accountable
- And fulfilling our moral obligation to the society as a whole

2. What are some early warning signs teachers, parents, or friends should pay attention to?

A sudden change in the child's normal pattern is a cause for alarm as this is a very noticeable sign. Social withdrawal and isolation: The child is withdrawn from his or her peers or friends, they no longer enjoy the activities they do participate in and enjoy.

- A drop in their grades
- Unusual fear of someone or a place
- Unexplained bruises or injuries
- Difficulty with concentration

3. How can schools create a safe environment for students to speak up?

- Setting up counseling services and safe spaces where students can discuss their problems.
- The culture of inclusion
- Creating a safe space within the classrooms
- Education against bullying
- Training of teachers to be able to spot any child abuse issues.

4. If a child reports abuse, what is the very first step an adult (parent, teacher or guardian) should take?

The step to take is to listen to that child without being judgmental, do not apportion blame at all let the child be happy that he or she reported to you then report to the appropriate authorities.

5. As a counselor what message would you give to children who are afraid to speak out?

Take charge, and speak up you're stronger and braver than you think I am rooting for you

3. Encourage Healthy Expression

4. Be Present and Involved

Small actions—checking in after school, attending their events, or spending quality time—show that you care.

5. Teach Coping Skills

Support them in developing habits like journaling, exercise, prayer, or mindfulness to manage stress.

6. Model Emotional Strength

Teens learn more from what they see than what they are told. Demonstrate calmness, patience, and respect in your own daily behaviour.
